The Washington Monument, one of DC's flagship landmarks, reopens to the public on 12 May 2014 after damages sustained during the 2011 earthquake caused it to close for three years.

A total of \$15 million has been spent on repairing the damage made by the 5.8 magnitude earthquake.

Over 600,000 visitors annually enter the structure that honours George Washington, revolutionary war hero and the first President of the United States of America.

The monument, built in two stages before and after the American Civil War, is shaped in an Egyptian obelisk to evoke the timelessness of ancient civilisations.

The Harz National Park, a nature reserve spread out around the Brocken Mountain, is an area of mountains, deep valleys with rich forests, mysterious caves and clear mountain lakes and waterfalls.

Among the historical sites, three places in the Harz region have been granted UNESCO World Heritage status.

There are the mines of Rammelsberg, Goslar and the Upper Harz Water Management System; the birthplace of Martin Luther in the city of Eisleben and the medieval Old Town of Quedlinburg, where Henry I became the first king of the Holy Roman Empire of the German Nation.

The Stratford Butterfly Farm, Warwickshire UK

Ten new Mousebirds with spiky funky hair are the latest addition to the Stratford Butterfly Farm.

Officially known as Colius striatus, the speckled mousebird is the largest species of mousebird as well as one of the most common, which can grow up to 35cm with their tail comprising approximately half the length.

Mousebirds are so called because of their habits of foraging the forest floor in search of fruit and berries fallen from the trees.

With their mousey brown colouring it is easy to confuse them with mice.

They can hang upside down in precarious positions thanks to their dexterous feet. The birds are extremely social and like to live in small groups. When threatened there are extremely noisy!

The birds originate from all over the tropical regions of Africa as well as into savanna and open woodlands.

Trinity House Open Day

17 May 2014

Trinity House is the working office of the General Lighthouse Authority (GLA) for England and Wales with responsibility for nearly 600 Aids to Navigation from traditional aids such as lighthouses, buoys and beacons to the latest satellite navigation technology.

In 1514 a young King Henry VIII granted a Royal Charter to a fraternity of mariners called the Guild of the Holy Trinity "so that they might regulate the pilotage of ships in the King's streams" and the month of May marks the 500th anniversary of this milestone event in British maritime history.

Visitors during the open day will discover the treasures and artefacts on display within its five elegant rooms and access areas.

Trinity House is located on Tower Hill overlooking the Tower of London and the picturesque Trinity Square Gardens containing a memorial to merchant navy heroes of two World Wars and the Falklands War.

- IWM Duxford, an aviation museum and Britain's best preserved wartime airfield
- Churchill War Rooms, housed in Churchill's secret headquarters below Whitehall, and
- the Second World War cruiser HMS Belfast.

Stepping into the Galleries, presented with three large ship models, visitors will be introduced to what life in Britain was like at the turn of the 20th century.

This was before the European rivalries that were developing, and crucially as the crisis of July 1914 led to war, and why Britain felt it had to fight.



A focus on IWM (cont)

In Shock

In Shock, will enable visitors hear the scream of shrapnel and shells they will come face to face with the French 75mm field gun, one of the new 'quick-firing' guns which contributed to the deaths of a million European men in just four months of fighting in 1914.

Objects on display for the first time come from the Christmas Truce, including a button from a German tunic that was given to a British soldier as a souvenir.

There will also be the chance to discover how a state of *Deadlock* ensued on the battlefields of the Western Front as soldiers sought refuge from the onslaught of artillery in trenches and dugouts.

A series of trench signs, such as those 'to Hells corner' and 'Piccadilly Circus' will show the complexity of these networks, alongside objects outlining innovations in trench warfare.

Objects displayed include a catapult for hurling grenades, the geophones used in mines beneath the trenches to detect the enemy, and a hollowed out fake tree used as a camouflage look out in no man's land.

Your Country Needs You

Drawing on IWM's rich poster collection, Your Country Needs You will focus on recruitment and propaganda, with the initial calls to join Field Marshal Kitchener's Army, and how he soon became a celebrity with objects such as a Kitchener doll and letters from adoring fans asking to marry him.

to counter it, by launching campaigns in the Middle East, Africa and Gallipoli.

World War

In World War, interactive maps will portray Germany's global strategy and Britain's attempts

Walking around a naval gun from HMS Chester, visitors will learn about Jack Cornwell VC who, at16, manned the gun in the Battle of Jutland and Tirpitz, a pig that was saved from the sea after the German ship SMS Dresden sank off the coast of Chile and later became a mascot for HMS Glasgow.

The Supply Line

The Supply Line, an interactive table over four metres long in Feeding the Front, will show the scale of production required on the home front to keep the troops fed and fighting.

Total War

At the centre of the Galleries with the towering 9.2 inch howitzer gun 'Mother' on display, Total War will explore the Battle of the Somme.

This campaign started in July 1916 and continued for five months, marking a pivotal point in the war.

The scale of casualties in this battle will be represented on a map that had a cross marked on it to represent each of the graves dug, alongside a Union Jack used by a chaplain to conduct burials on the Somme.

Visitors will also be able to watch the original 1916 documentary film of the battle - now UNESCO listed.

Life at the Front

Life at the Front will look at the reality of what life was like for the troops in and behind the trenches.

It includes:

- the kit they were issued
- the extra kit their families sent out such as medical supplies including cocaine and opium
- what they ate; recreational activities such as plays, vegetable shows and sports days, and
- the souvenirs they would collect such as a scrap of wallpaper taken from a German trench.

At all Costs

On the home front, At all Costs explores how the fervour to win the war grew in Britain, and how it penetrated every level of British society, infiltrating the lives of everyone.

The role of women is explored through uniforms, photos and the life stories of those who stepped into roles in the factories, hospitals, transport and agriculture industries.

The area also describes how children were not spared from the efforts.

A jumper which belonged to a Sea Scout tells the story of their observation role along the coast.

Visitors will learn how British civilians came under enemy air attack, how artillery came to be fired on the streets of Dublin in the Easter rising, and Germany's fateful decision to launch a campaign of unrestricted submarine warfare which ultimately brought the USA into the war on the side of the Allies.



A focus on IWM (cont)

Machines against Men

Machines against Men will feature the stories of two famous air aces, British Major James McCudden VC and the German 'Red Baron', Manfred von Richtofen.

Fragments from the planes in which they met their deaths will be on display.

It will look out how animals were used for communication before focusing on the iconic mud clotted battle of Passchendaele.

Breaking Down

Breaking Down highlights the terrible strains that people endured both on the fighting and home fronts will be explored.

In addition how German submarine attacks led to rationing in Britain, while the British naval blockade meant hunger, even starvation for Germany and its allies.

The severe lack of resources will be depicted through collection items such as clothes made of paper and wooden soled shoes.

Seizing Victory

Seizing Victory will tell the dramatic story of 1918, where visitors will see how after almost another year of war, from near defeat, Allied forces were able to claim victory.

War Without End

War Without End, will show how the war changed the world forever, highlighting the enormous human cost, the new world order that emerged, the indelible changes which the war had on British society and the Empire.
